Ragmus liebnechti Girault, Pamphlet, Pub. by author, Brisbane, May, 24, 1934.

Lectotype male, paralectotypes 3 males and 1 nymph, Colton Squares, Galton, Q1d. 9.II. 1926, E. Ballard. One of the labels bears the identification as Ragmus importunitas Distant (Ballard det.). The species is a synonym of Campylomma livida Reuter, 1884. From this label probably Girault applied the generic name of Ragmus to these species.

Ragmus pulcher Girault, Pamphlet Pub. by author, Brisbane, May 24, 1934.

Lectotype female, paralectotypes 2 males Stanhorpe 28.IX.1929, E. Sutton. More specimens were lost on the cartoon. The species is also a synonym of Campylomma livida Reuter, 1884.

 Ragmus seminigricaput Girault, Pamphlet Pub. by author, Sydney, Dec. 24, 1934.

> Lectotype male, paralectotype 2 females, Indooropoly, August 30, 1934. This species is correct and belongs to *Campylomma* Reuter, 1878.

 - Lectotype male, paralectotype male, Indooropoly, garden, March 11, 1934. The species is a snonym of *Sidnia kinbergi* (Stäl).
- Capsus marmoratus Girault, a manuscript name for a species of Austrocapsus Kirkaldy, 1901 not yet described, There are 3 females, Qld. N.º 2200, Leg. Wats, Sunnybank, Nov. 1926, D. A. J. Summerville.
- 10. The type of Cephalocapsidea stali Girault, Pamphlet Pub. by author, Brisbane, Queensland, Nov., 20, 1937 also was not found. The genus occurs only in Africa and belongs to the tribe Phylini.

SUMMARY

The author studied the types of mirids described by A. A. Girault from 1934-1936, presently in the Collection of the Department of Primary Industry, Entomological Branch, Brisbane, Queensland, Australia. Synonymy is established and lectotypes designated.
